- 3. Be active: be an artist if you are an artist, you should never be bored. There is always something to create. Many successful artists



Bruno Fabriani, Italy

Following His Passion for the Art of Street Painting

Bruno Fabriani, a retired air traffic controller, started street painting about 16 years ago. He was inspired to try it when he joined a new group of artists called madonnari. Their techniques impressed him and inspired him to learn the art. Since then he has dedicated much of his time spreading the joy of the ancient art of Italian Street Painting with others.



Bruno sometimes works with other artists, but prefers to work alone. Usually traveling with his wife, Paola, they enjoy going to new places and street painting has been an avenue to see places they had never been to before.



He finds faces and hands to be the most challenging and difficult. Bruno enjoys giving workshops and inspiring new artists to try the artform. He finds inspiration in the

works of Kurt Wenner and his friend, Luigi Legno. One of the most unusual places he has chalked was in the old city of Willemstad on the island of Curacao in 2011 on old bricks in an alley.

Artist turns car into rolling chalk art experiment

Owning a car can be nerve-racking. Keeping the thing clean is a pursuit that takes a lot of energy, especially in a big city. One artist, though, is inviting people to make their mark on his automobile, and inspiring some creativity along the way. Philip Romano slapped a coat of special paint on his 2004 Hyundai to turn it into a moving chalkboard recently. Since then, he has been driving around New York City inviting people to take turns writing whatever they wish on the exterior.



Last Thursday, Romano parked it outside of the Museum of Modern Art, where it attracted a horde of people waiting to create some chalk art. Passersby swarmed the automobile, adding drawings and phrases. Romano even got attention from Fox 5 News, who interviewed him about the endeavor. Asked about the reason for the project, he said, "I just had the idea a few years ago, that when I got my first car, I wanted it to be an old used car, and I wanted to cover it in chalkboard paint and let people draw all over it." Simple enough!

Romano even added a custom state license plate, which reads "DRAWONME." If the delighted faces of the people giving it a try are any indication, it looks like Romano has struck a chalk-chord with amateur artists

created mounds of work, most of which doesn't see the light of day.

- 4. Value yourself, your time and your skills Don't give away your art/time. It not only hurts
 you, but it hurts every other working artist.
- 5. Share your knowledge and resources be a mentor to a younger artist, share your bad experiences, so others can avoid those pitfalls.
- **6. Focus, strategize and plan** approach being an artist like any other business.
- 7. Be critical, be fair it does no one any good to live in a fantasy world. The truth (doled out carefully), can help others over hurdles and grow into great artists, rather than stagnate as so-so artists.
- 8. Know your rights the internet is a wonderful tool. You now have at your fingertips information that was only available through a lawyer with a library of books.

Did you know...

Sidewalk Sam is the performance name of Robert Charles Guillemin (born 4 May 1939), a Boston-based artist who resides in Newton, Massachusetts. He is best recognized for his reproductions of European masterpieces, chalked or painted on the sidewalk.

Following an accident in 1994 that left him paralyzed, Guillemin increased his focus on large participatory art projects for communities and businesses. His motto, on a stickie at the top of his computer, reads "*Entertain, Inspire, Empower and Unite*."
